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Modern spine surgery techniques can provide life-changing results. The spine, our body's backbone, is a marvel of nature. It's made up of bones, nerves, and tissues working together to support us. But oftentimes, an injury or wear and tear can press on the nerves and cause a lot of pain. Generally, doctors attempt to address patients' spine issues through physical therapy whenever possible. However, if the injury is too severe or therapy does not work, consulting an orthopedic spine surgeon is often the best option.

Orthopedics is the branch of medicine that focuses on disorders and injuries to the musculoskeletal system — your bones, muscles, joints, and other connective tissues. For many people with joint injuries or pain, orthopedic surgeons can make a huge difference in quality of life. Orthopedic surgeons can restore function

by repairing a wide range of conditions, such as fractures, joint injuries, sports injuries, arthritis, congenital disorders, and degenerative diseases. For some patients, that might mean just being able to get out of bed in the morning.

Visalia native Mann Harrison had been living with progressively worsening back pain for years. By 2023, his condition had become so severe that he could barely leave his bed, and even the simplest movements were an immense struggle.

"After a while, I could barely move around. I was desperate for some kind of relief," he recalls. "Dr. Feng was one of the doctors who saw me in the hospital, and he told me he could help."

Frank L. Feng, DO, an orthopedic surgeon at Sequoia Orthopaedic & Spine Institute in Visalia, is one of the many trusted surgeons who perform complex surgeries at Kaweah Health.

He treats most orthopedic conditions and performs many types of surgeries including spine, total joint replacements, carpal tunnel, as well as treatment of fractures, both surgically and non-surgically. In addition, Dr. Feng helps patients with pain management through procedures like epidural injections, spinal cord stimulators, and pain pumps. For more than 25 years, he has been dedicated to helping countless individuals like Mann, and finds immense fulfillment in his work.

"I truly strive to assist people with difficult problems," Dr. Feng says. "Spinal conditions can be life-altering and sometimes life-threatening, and I want to help them regain a better quality of life. It's incredibly gratifying for both me and my staff to be able to make such a positive impact."



In Mann's case, the tissue between the vertebrae in his spine had become damaged due to wear and tear from years of sports and construction work.

"Over time and consistent use, these tissues can degrade, causing the bones in your spine to compress and pinch nerves, which can result in severe pain," Dr. Feng explains. "That was precisely Mann's situation. His nerves were being pinched so severely that his pain was constant and debilitating. He also had an undiagnosed stress fracture in the back of the spinal column."

To remedy the intense, daily pain Mann was experiencing, Dr. Feng performed a spinal fusion surgery. This procedure involves permanently joining two or more vertebrae in the spine to relieve pain, correct issues, and restore stability. The fusion prevents movement between the vertebrae, aiming to reduce discomfort. Surgeons insert bone or bonelike material between the vertebrae, sometimes using metal plates, screws, or rods to hold them in place.



"I am a completely different man today," he says. "I am walking again, and there is no more nerve pain."

Dr. Feng affirms that outcomes from spinal fusion surgery are typically very positive.

"The technology and techniques available today are better than ever, and patients are able to regain a much higher quality of life," he says.

The Kaweah Health Family Birthing Center consists of the Labor and Delivery and Mother Baby Units, two of the busiest units at Kaweah Health Medical Center, helping bring more than 350 babies each month into the Central Valley community. With thousands of babies delivered each year, there are people coming and going 24/7, and families grow larger by the hour.

For expecting mothers and their families, the Labor and Delivery Unit is where most women begin their journey. Nurse Manager Laura Robertson is in charge of

fter giving birth, both mom and the new baby (or babies!) are moved to the Mother Baby Unit, where plenty of support is given to help both parties reach the best health possible. Nurse Manager Stephanie Genetti oversees this busy department and its steady flow of mothers, babies, and family members who come through every day.

"It's hard to believe that more than 4,200 babies are born here each year," she says. "Our team is always busy, but we take pride in taking good care of the moms who come through here."

Stephanie adds there is a lot of empathy that comes with being a nurse here.

"A lot of the women on our team are moms, and quite a few of us had our babies here, so we know firsthand the emotions people are experiencing," she says. "We make sure that everyone gets the care and attention they need to feel confident and have a great experience."

The Labor and Delivery and Mother Baby Units are committed to providing support and education to any mother seeking it. Patients can meet with Kaweah Health's Lactation Services before birth, during hospitalization, and even after discharge. The units strive to create an environment that promotes long-term health, which includes adhering to the latest research such as skin-to-skin contact and delayed bathing to increase bonding.

Strathmore football coach makes a remarkable journey.

trathmore High School ended its 2023 football season with a winning streak that stretched into the playoffs and didn't stop until they had won their second state championship in seven years. It was an amazing run for coach Jeromy Blackwell and his team, but even more amazing considering Jeromy's scary accident and recovery over that previous summer.

On June 30, 2023, Jeromy was barbecuing some lunch and working in his backyard when he got his feet tangled up with the family's 14-year-old Yorkie poodle.

"That's the last thing I remember," says Jeromy. "I reached out for the patio cover support to catch myself, but couldn't hold on."

Jeromy fell off-balance, face first into the concrete, knocking himself unconscious. For almost two hours, he lay unconscious in the 100-plus degree summer heat.

Fortunately, his wife Caroline went outside to check on him and discovered him face down in a puddle of mud, making gurgling sounds. She quickly called 911 and emergency responders transported



Jeromy to Kaweah Health Medical Center, where he was diagnosed with severe dehydration, a concussion, heatstroke, and pneumonia from inhaling mud. Due to his critical condition, doctors decided to aid his recovery by inducing a coma. A medically-induced coma is a controlled, reversible slowdown of brain function that can protect the brain after a severe injury.

Eight days later, doctors brought Jeromy out of the coma, while surrounded by family and friends. Jeromy was confused at what had happened.

"My first memory was seeing my daughter, wife, and high school football coach," he says. "I had no idea what had happened. Even today, it's hard to believe."

Jeromy still had some more healing to do before going home, and he is forever grateful to all of the people who helped care for him.

"My nurses were amazing — protective, and always looking out for me," he says. "When I woke up. I was afraid to fall asleep because I was scared I wouldn't wake up again, but my nurses were so good to me, and helped me get through it. My doctors and nurses literally saved my life."

> Jeromy went home later that month, and at the start of the school year, he was back on his feet, ready for one of the best coaching seasons of his life. He looks back at his experience and recovery with a humble gratitude.

"Those moments have changed my life. They gave me more focus and taught me to live more purposefully," he says. "Just like everyone who helped save my life, we are here to spread the good and help each other." 🖼

The Devoted, as they are referenced in the poem, are the guardians of that flame, through every circumstance.

Crucial financial backing was generously provided by local donors and businesses such as the Shannon Family, California Water Service, and dedicated Kaweah staff. The final result is a sanctuary of peace and contemplation on the Kaweah Health Medical Center campus. The monument and its flame, which lights up from sunset to sunrise each day, stand as a shining symbol of the compassionate spirit that runs throughout the caregivers and support staff at Kaweah Health.

"This Reflection Garden and Monument is intended to serve as a beacon of hope, a source of inspiration, and a testament to the enduring spirit of compassion that defines our organization," said Kaweah Health CEO Gary Herbst during the dedication ceremony on May 21, 2024.

Since its completion, many have gathered to spend time with this lasting tribute to Kaweah Health's caregivers. Kaweah Health is proud to have such a place to reflect and honor those who devote their lives to healing. For our nurses, doctors, staff, and community, it is a small place to pause, reflect, and find solace amidst the daily intensity of their roles in caring for our community.

Since graduating from Redwood High School in 2024, Jennah has been deep in her training routine as she eyes her August 2024 professional boxing debut. The youngest of seven siblings who all wrestled, Jennah started her journey at the age of four after finding a box full of medals her siblings had won at a Junior Olympics competition. She was inspired and quickly developed a determination to work hard and become a champion at whatever she did. When her father, Larry Creason,

took Jennah to the Visalia Police Activities League when she was 8 years old, she begged her dad to let her box with the boys.

"When your daughter wants to go fight with a bunch of boys, your instinct is to say no," Larry recalls. "But she has always been so serious about her



Setting her sights on her first professional boxing match, Jennah started working out at Kaweah Health Lifestyle Fitness Center in early 2024 so that she could seriously focus on training.

"My dad wanted me to work out in a safe place where I could go at night and not worry about anything," Jennah says.

She was laser-focused on her goal and training hard, but heading into the fight, four opponents all dropped out at the last minute, and no replacement could be found.

"It was a big letdown, but it just gives me more time to get even better for the next fight," she says.





By the end of her senior year in high school, Jennah had amassed a long list of championships in wrestling, boxing, jiu-jitsu, and Thai boxing at regional, state, national, and international competitions, and she just missed the age eligibility for the 2024 Olympic boxing team trials.

As the next fight approaches, Jennah is heading back to Lifestyle Fitness Center, working hard to stay strong and focused.

"I can basically do anything I need to there," she says. "I love the indoor track, and the Drop Zone is perfect for strength and balance training."

Whoever Jennah ends up fighting in her professional boxing debut, they had better be ready — because she definitely will be. 🖼

he Rotary Respite House is a joint endeavor born from a vision of compassion and community support. Established in 2016, this unique sanctuary was born out of an understanding of the challenges faced by families from out of the area with hospitalized loved ones. To meet this challenge, the Visalia Rotary Community Foundation joined forces with Kaweah Health to provide a comfortable and affordable lodging option for those in need.

The Visalia Rotary Community Foundation was formed in 1992 and is composed of four local Rotary chapters, all of which contribute funding to the foundation. Since inception, the foundation has given close to \$4 million in community aid through various initiatives. Eric Shannon, the foundation's executive director of long-term fundraising/planned giving, recalls the inspiration behind the Respite House.

"There was a smaller respite house operated by a local church, and it was always busy," he says. "We saw it as an opportunity to make a difference and help those families with loved ones at the hospital."

The house has two adjoining residences: Al's Place and Sharon's Place, named after Rotarian Al Fisher and Eric

Shannon's mother, Sharon Shannon. Since opening in 2016, these fully-furnished units have assisted more than 500 families. Eric is proud of how the Visalia community members come together to support projects like the Respite House.

"It's one of the things that makes Visalia unique — the people who live here step up and get involved," he says. "We raised more than \$500,000 to build the Respite House, and that was all donated by Rotarians and other local donors."

The Respite House also supports new resident doctors in Kaweah Health's Graduate Medical Education program by providing short-term housing. This helps ease the stress of relocation and allows residents to focus on their studies and work while settling into their new roles.

As families continue to find solace at the Respite House, its impact ripples through the community, fostering healing, recovery, and a sense of compassion and support during challenging times. Kaweah Health is so appreciative of the support the Visalia Rotary Community Foundation has provided to its patients and their families.

rom humble beginnings in Tulare, Carlos Rangel Barrera, MD is today an OB/GYN doctor, serving the communities of Exeter and Lindsay at Kaweah Health's rural health clinics. The term OB/GYN stands for obstetrician/gynecologist, which is a medical doctor who combines two disciplines: obstetrics and gynecology. Gynecology is the care of a woman's reproductive organs and health, while obstetrics involves the treatment of pregnant women, including the delivery of babies.

Dr. Rangel was born at Kaweah Health Medical Center in 1984. His parents emigrated from Mexico and settled in Tulare County. They always dreamed he would be a doctor one day.

During his childhood, he developed a strong desire to help others in his community. He studied hard throughout high school, was accepted to Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT), and later attended Harvard Medical School. After finishing at Harvard, Dr. Rangel began a four-year residency at Harbor-UCLA Medical Center.

"It was really amazing that all of my dreams, and my parents' dreams for so many years had finally come true," he says.

After completing his residency, Dr. Rangel began practicing medicine as an OB/GYN in Southern California, but he missed his home community in Tulare County.
